

The Returning Officer wishes to inform you of your rights.

Can you vote?

To vote, **you must be entered on the list of electors** and fulfill the following conditions on polling day:

- be at least 18 years old;
- be a Canadian citizen; and
- be domiciled in Québec for the past six months.

Is your name entered on the list of electors?

You can check this by consulting the notice that you receive at home.

How can you enter your name on the list of electors?

You must go to a board of revisors to file an application for entry or correction on the list of electors. A relative, your spouse or a person living with you can file an application on your behalf.

You must present two pieces of identification with your application; otherwise, it will be rejected.

1st document

The first must show your name and your date of birth. **Example:** Birth certificate, health insurance card, Canadian passport.

2nd document

The second must show your name and your address. **Example:** Driver's licence, telephone or electricity bill.

Where is the board of revisors located?

The addresses of boards of revisors and the days and times when they are open are indicated on the notice that you receive at home.

Where and when do I go to vote?

A few days before polling day, you will receive a reminder card stating where and when you will vote. On polling day, go to the address indicated between 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. You can also vote in the advance poll. The address and the opening days and times of your advance polling station are shown on the notice that you will receive at home. All polling stations at the advance poll are accessible to persons with reduced mobility.

New: four additional days to vote

Are you unable to vote on polling day or on the days of the advance poll? You have four additional days to vote at the election office in your borough. All borough election offices are accessible to persons with reduced mobility.

How to vote?

- Step 1** An election official checks your entry on the list of electors.
- Step 2** You identify yourself and show a piece of ID.
- Step 3** You are given ballot papers.
- Step 4** You go to the booth where you can make your choice confidentially. You mark the ballot papers in only one of the circles using only the pencil that will be provided to you by the deputy returning officer.
- Step 5** Return to the table after voting.
- Step 6** Personally deposit your ballot papers in the ballot box.

Important! To vote, you have to establish your identity by presenting one of the following documents:

- health insurance card
- driver's licence
- Canadian passport
- certificate of Indian status
- Canadian Forces Identification card.

Are you unable to move about?

If you are unable to move about for health reasons, you can vote in your domicile. To do so, a written application must be sent to the Office of the Returning Officer. If you would like to vote in your domicile, you can obtain information on how to register by contacting the Office of the Returning Officer.
